Enjoy live-action and animated films showcasing different family ties, followed up with engaging discussions led by a Museum educator, and suggestions for follow-up activities in the Museum's galleries.

Oh Brother, My Brother. 1979. USA. Directed by Carol and Ross Lowell. Made by their parents, this touching portrait of two young brothers shows the give and take of their relationship. Though narrated from the point of view of the older brother, the film takes a loving look at the ambivalent feelings of a six-year-old and the contrary behavior of a two year old. 14 min.

With Grandma. 1999. Canada. Directed by Françoise Hartmann. A lyrical look at the shared experiences of a young girl visiting with her grandmother. 9 min.

The Yellow House: Kevin The Superhero. 2009. Denmark. Directed by Catherine Kunze and Jacob Wellendorf. From a series of films about two little girls named Chloë and Thea who live in a Copenhagen housing block, we are introduced to their six-year-old friend Kevin, who dreams of growing up to be a superhero, and Kevin's mother who comes from Senegal, Africa. 9 min.
