*Alike.* 2015. Spain. Directed by Daniel Martínez Lara & Rafa Cano Méndez. In a busy life, Copi is a father who tries to teach the right way to his son, Paste. But what is the correct path? 8 min.

*Ish.* 2005. USA. Directed by Gary Goldberger, John Lechner & Peter H. Reynolds. With a little encouragement from his sister, Ramon discovers that creativity is about a lot more than getting things just 'right'. Narrated by Chester Gregory with music by Joel Goodman. 7 min.

*Caine's Arcade.* 2012. USA. Directed by by Nirvan Mullick. Meet Caine Monroy, a nine year old boy from East L.A. who spent his summer vacation constructing a cardboard arcade at his dad's auto parts store. He recreated his favorite arcade games, made prizes and even designed his own security system!
