

RYAN McGINNESS CREATES LIMITED-EDITION PRINT FOR MoMA BENEFIT

Ryan McGinness (American, b. 1972) has created a limited-edition screenprint for the October 31 Opening Night Preview Party of the International Fine Print Dealers Association's Seventeenth Annual Print Fair, which benefits the Department of Prints and Illustrated Books of The Museum of Modern Art. In this work, *Kaleiding Petals (Peripheral Drift Illusion)* (2007), McGinness's playful and provocative vocabulary of icons—inspired by signage, corporate logos, and references to art history—is set into motion through dynamic optical effects. The print will be available to the first 100 ticket buyers at the Benefactor level (Tickets starting at \$2000).

WOMEN IN MODERNISM: MAKING PLACES IN ARCHITECTURE EXPLORES THEROLE OF ARCHITECTURAL ARBITERS IN THE 20TH-CENTURY ON OCTOBER 25

MoMA presents **Women in Modernism: Making Places in Architecture**, a program exploring the role that architectural arbiters—of the past and the present—have had and continue to have in shaping the history and defining the legacy of modern architecture in the United States on Thursday, October 25 at 6:30 p.m. in the Celeste Bartos Theater at The Museum of Modern Art. Scholars, curators, architects, and others will address the process of selection and the values that they employ each time they design a course or exhibition, or publish a book or an article.

Participants include **Sarah Herda**, Director, The Graham Foundation for Advanced Studies in the Fine Arts, Chicago; **Toshiko Mori**, architect and Robert P. Hubbard Professor in the Practice of Architecture and Chair of the Department of Architecture, Harvard University; **Karen Stein**, former Editorial Director, Phaidon Press; and main speaker, **Gwendolyn Wright**, architectural historian and Professor of Architecture, Planning, and Preservation, Columbia University. **Barry Bergdoll**, The Philip Johnson Chief Curator, Department of Architecture and Design, The Museum of Modern Art, moderates the discussion, with a welcome by **Beverly Willis**, FAIA.
