

MoMA PS1'S SIGNATURE EXHIBITION *GREATER NEW YORK* FEATURES 53 ARTISTS AND COLLECTIVES FROM ACROSS NEW YORK CITY

LONG ISLAND CITY, New York, April 2, 2026—MoMA PS1 presents *Greater New York 2026*, the sixth edition of the museum's signature survey of artists living and working in the New York City area, featuring 53 artists and collectives. On view from April 16 through August 17, 2026, this iteration spans the entirety of the building and features over 150 works, including site-specific installations, new productions, performances and recent works, most of which have never before been exhibited. The exhibition includes a range of media from painting and photography to animation and scenography, as well as a performance program premiering works by eight artists over three dates in May and June. In celebration of the museum's 50th anniversary, the quinquennial exhibition is organized for the first time by the full MoMA PS1 curatorial team. Forefronting the perspectives of early and mid-career artists, *Greater New York 2026* emphasizes the forces that shape daily life in the city today, as well as strategies of resistance and adaptation in the face of increased surveillance, accelerating technologies, and system breakdown.

"*Greater New York* forms the backbone of MoMA PS1's commitment to New York's vibrant community of artists, and responds to urgent issues in real time, as expressed by all of the creative voices in our region," said Connie Butler, Agnes Gund Director. "As a signature program coinciding with our 50th anniversary, we look forward to marking the occasion with *Greater New York*, which has become a barometer of artistic production whose reverberations shape global dialogues."

"*Greater New York* explores the infrastructures that govern and pressurize life in the region," said Chief Curator and Director of Curatorial Affairs Ruba Katrib. "Across media, artists in New York are addressing urgent concerns with varied approaches and aesthetics, from polish to ruination, claustrophobia to collective action and community. Several of the artists have strong ties to Queens, from those born in the borough—including Dean Majd, Piero Penizzotto, Kenneth Tam, Candace Hill-Montgomery, and Devlin Claro—to the Cevallos Brothers, who have worked with many businesses around Jackson Heights, and the Flushing-based collective Red Canary Song, who have a dedicated presentation in our Homeroom gallery as part of *Greater New York*."

A dedicated performance program extends the exhibition's inquiries into the powers of staging and spectacle within the city. May 2 features comedic ventriloquism by Sophie Becker, a participatory stand-up act by Rezarta Seferi, and a performance that stages reflective encounters through full-length mirrors by Symara Sarai. On May 30, Chang Yuchen and Kameelah Janan Rasheed premiere a collaborative performance lecture examining language in their practices; Tom Thayer immerses audience in sound, shadow, and live video mixing; and Kite debuts an improvisational musical performance that explores sonic collectivity, guided by the Lakǎóta values of exchange and reciprocity. On June 27 in MoMA PS1's courtyard, Georgica Pettus debuts *Truck*, a full-length play that follows people competing in an endurance competition at a car dealership in South Texas.

Greater New York 2026 is organized by the MoMA PS1 curatorial team: Jody Graf and Elena Ketelsen González, Associate Curators; Kari Rittenbach, Assistant Curator; Sheldon Gooch, Curatorial Assistant; and Andrea Sánchez, Curatorial Coordinator; led by Connie Butler, The Agnes Gund Director, and Ruba Katrib, Chief Curator and Director of Curatorial Affairs.
